A NOTE FROM THE CHAIR



As I sit down to write this, my last note as the Chair, I realise how far we have evolved as a group. Not only in the last year, or the last seven years of my Chair reign, but in the last 70 years. It is quite an amazing achievement to belong to an amateur dramatic group that came together so long ago and has successfully provided non-stop entertainment throughout the years, under so many leaderships, and yet remained as part of the same church body.

2017 saw us put on our regular three productions: *Wife After Death* in February, *Enchanted April* in May and *The Game's Afoot* in October, as well as a mini-sketch of our own version of *Robin Hood* in Eastcote House Gardens in June and the St Lawrence Fun Day in August. Much to our relief, the new hall lights were finally installed in September which meant that we were able to show them off, to the best of our ability, in our October play. We had a few social events including a meal at Remo's Village, Eastcote, and a coach day trip to Chichester to see *Fiddler on the Roof*. Our year was truly

highlighted at our Christmas drinks and nibbles evening in December, when we presented Jacob Sawyerr and his mother, Angela, a substantial cheque to help aid his recovery through his disabilities. It was a great honour to meet Jacob and to witness his and Angela's gratitude. We were doubly privileged to meet Jackie too, a representative for our Charity 2018, the RNIB Sunshine House School. Coincidentally, Angela and Jackie recognised each other from when Angela was seeking advice for Jacob's visual impairments.



Alongside all last year's activities, great preparations have been made towards celebrating 70 years of St Lawrence Players. A 2018 Special Edition Calendar with some past photographs was produced and Valerie boldly took on the task of putting together our celebration ideas and writing the script for this production. The idea was to include everyone and introduce a new generation to the past in a modern and fun way. I believe Valerie and her team have done us proud. It's been a massive project but huge fun. I hope you all agree that it is possibly "The best one yet"!

OUR CHARITY FOR 2018: SUNSHINE HOUSE SCHOOL



The RNIB Sunshine House School has, over the years, developed into a school that caters and supports approximately fifty children from ages 3 to 14 years who are blind or partially sighted and have significant learning and other disabilities.

The origins of the 'home' date back 100 years but it has always been in Northwood. The School nowadays caters only for day pupils who all come from local areas.

The School's highly qualified team of teachers, therapists and specialists work closely with parents and carers to ensure that the children's achievements go beyond the classroom into everyday life. The school provides a safe and supportive environment for these children, offering specialist education, in-house therapies, health support and family services. It is therefore able to support a wide range of needs including: vision impairment, multi-sensory impairment, and learning, physical and communication difficulties as well as additional medical and health needs. This support together with the latest modern technology equipment that is available help ensure that all the children at the School can meet their full potential.

The School's site is owned by the RNIB. However, the School is very much self-funded for their many specialist needs and they rely heavily on donations from their supporters, including parents and carers and the general public.

The RNIB Sunshine House School is a very worthy charity that St Lawrence Players are pleased to support this year. We, in turn, thank you for your support.



MORE THAN 70 YEARS OF ST LAWRENCE PLAYERS

You may be surprised to learn that a group by the name of St Laurence Players performed Epiphany Mystery plays here as far back as 1935-36, when the choir was thanked for its contribution to the success of these plays.



In January 1938, a dramatic society

known as the St Lawrence Mummers appeared on the scene. Admission was free to the entertainment, but there was a silver collection and any profits went towards the Permanent Hall Fund. The new section, added to the old hall, housed the stage and back rooms. This was opened in February 1940 but, because of World War 2 activities, had to be put on hold.

A Mrs and Miss Angell moved into the bungalow in the 1940s and remained in residence until the late 1950s. The same bungalow has undergone many alterations since that time, but it is still much in use today. Miss Lillian Angell worked extremely hard in the parish, especially when the Revd Godwin was vicar. She encouraged both young and old members to participate in church activities; she particularly liked to involve the young. For many years she taught in the Sunday School. After the success of the scholars' Christmas play in 1945, the youngsters were keen to do more in the way of acting and the St Lawrence Juvenile Players was formed. At the summer fete in 1945, they presented scenes from *Alice in Wonderland* arranged by Miss Angell. This was followed by further productions; the success of these raised £20 for children's charities over the year. By 1954 the Junior Players Club had evolved into the St Lawrence Youth Fellowship.

In 1947 the St Lawrence Senior Players was established as a separate group and had become more ambitious, but for a number of years they joined together with the Junior Players to take part in the many pantomimes, revues, and church Nativity and Easter plays.

In February 1948, two performances of *The School for Scandal* received encouraging reviews in the local paper. The St Lawrence Players have continued the tradition of producing at least three shows a year with very few breaks.
